

DAVID STEVENS, MD is a family practice doctor, ethicist and CEO of the 15,000-member Christian Medical Association, the largest faith-based professional organization in the US. CMA works with graduate doctors as well as medical and dental students on 242 campuses, provides medical services to the poor in this country and abroad and serves as voice for its members on bioethical and healthcare issues. Its headquarters is in Bristol, TN.

SANDY CHRISTIANSEN, MD, FACOG is a board-certified obstetrician/gynecologist who was in private practice for ten years and currently serves as the National Medical Consultant to Care Net and is the medical director of Care Net Pregnancy Center of Frederick in Maryland, a non-profit organization existing to restore, equip and empower women to make choices regarding their reproductive health that are consistent with respect for human life. Dr. Christiansen is a member of the Christian Medical Association, the American Association of Pro-life OB/GYNs and is a Fellow of the American College of Obstetricians & Gynecologists. She has been a spokesperson for life in a variety of forums providing testimony before the President's Council on Bioethics, the Maryland Senate and Capitol Hill.

DONALD F. THOMPSON, MD, MPH&TM is the Senior Medical and Public Health Program Director in the Center for Infrastructure Protection at the George Mason University School of Law in Arlington, VA. Dr. Thompson received his Doctor of Medicine degree from the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, MD, a Masters Degree in Public Health and Tropical Medicine from Tulane University, and a Masters Degree in Cross-cultural Ministries from Dallas Theological Seminary. He is board certified in both Family Medicine and General Preventive Medicine and Public Health. He is fluent in Spanish and Italian. He recently retired as a Colonel in the United States Air Force after a 27 year career in a variety of biodefense, emergency public health, and security-related medical capacity building assignments that included policy analysis, inspection and evaluation, and strategic partnership development.

DR. JOHN T. BRUCHALSKI, F.A.C.O.G. grew up in northern New Jersey. After attending a Salesian High School and a Jesuit college he went to the University Of South Alabama College Of Medicine in Mobile, AL, receiving his MD degree in 1987. He completed his residency in obstetrics and gynecology at Eastern Virginia Medical Center and at the Jones Institute for Reproductive Medicine in Norfolk, Virginia in 1991. He received board certification in 1993.

He founded the Tepeyac Family Center in Fairfax, VA in 1994, with the mission of establishing an obstetrical and gynecological facility that combines the best of modern medicine with the healing presence of Jesus Christ -- providing affordable healthcare to women, in particular, those with crisis pregnancies. In 2000, he founded Divine Mercy Care, a non-profit organization bringing Catholic healthcare to Northern Virginia and is currently its President and the Chairman of its Board of Directors while still maintaining a full-time role as an OB-GYN at Tepeyac Family Center. In 2005, Tepeyac Family Center became a part of Divine Mercy Care and currently operates as the first Catholic

health care facility in the Diocese of Arlington. In 2008, Dr. Bruchalski expanded Divine Mercy Care with the founding of the DMC Pharmacy in Chantilly, VA.

He has spoken on various topics concerning the renaissance of Catholic medicine here in the United States, in Canada, and in Europe. He has been a part of numerous videos concerning pro-life issues, medicine, and natural family planning. He and Tepeyac Family Center were recently featured in a front-page article in *The Washington Post* and many local and national radio and television news shows.

Dr. Bruchalski has been married to his wife, Carolyn, since 1991 and is the father of two boys: John Paul, born in 1992 and Joseph, in 1996. They live in Oak Hill, Virginia.
